Masses Cancelled in Archdiocese of Baltimore

After receiving an update from State officials late today (March 14) on the current impact of the COVID-19 virus and acting on the advice of medical professionals, Archbishop William E Lori has determined that to safeguard the well-being the faithful of the Archdiocese of Baltimore and to prevent further community spread of the virus, all public Masses are canceled until further notice.

Archbishop Lori will celebrate a private Mass at the Cathedral of Mary Our Queen at 11 a.m.

The faithful are encouraged to remain connected to their parishes and invited to participate in the Mass via broadcast and livestream.

"My highest priority is the safety and welfare of the people of God of this Archdiocese," Archbishop Lori said. "I take this step with great sadness, but also with wholehearted determination that we continue to provide for the spiritual well-being of the faithful at a time when their faith is most needed."

Official Guidelines

Archbishop William E. Lori has announced the following updated guidelines (updates underlined) for the celebration of the Sacred Liturgy during this flu season and in light of concerns about the COVID-19 virus. These guidelines reinforce recommended practices to reduce the transmission of

governor addressed major steps being taken after the state confirmed its first case of community transmitted coronavirus:

"In light of the order today by Gov. Hogan that all public schools be closed for the next two weeks, I have similarly instructed that all archdiocesan schools be closed during the same time period, March 16-27, 2020 and that all schoolsponsored activities be cancelled during that same timeframe," the archbishop said.

Archbishop Lori created a task force to guide all archdiocesan decisions related to the COVID-19 virus, to be led by Auxiliary Bishop Adam J. Parker, and distributed detailed guidance to all parishes on liturgical safeguards, parish events and meetings, travel and other related concerns. In addition, archdiocesan schools have been making preparations for the offering of distance learning and out-of-school instruction.

Updated March 14, 2020

- The Archbishop of
 Baltimore has canceled all public Masses until further notice.
- 2. Holy Water fonts may be drained and remain empty at the discretion of each pastor. If they are not to remain empty, they must be drained, cleaned with a disinfectant, and re-filled with holy water on a regular basis. Please note that the removed holy water should be disposed of appropriately in the sacrarium or poured into the ground.
- 3. Alcohol-based or other appropriate waterless hand sanitizers should be made available at all church entrances. Additional precautions should be used in the maintenance of worship spaces and church halls, in particular the disinfecting of areas or

items which come into contact with hands, such as handrails, restroom areas, and the tops of pews.

- 4. Please be advised that until further notice, weddings and funerals may proceed but attendance should be limited to immediate family. Compliance with all state and local government-imposed restrictions on the number of people at public gatherings is mandatory, regardless of the type of gathering.
- 5. While churches should remain open for private prayer, including adoration, there should be no scheduled "services" that would bring people together at a specific time.

 Numbers of those in church should be monitored and signs noting the State order on the limitation of gatherings, social distancing and providing guidance on hygiene should be posted.

 Hand sanitizer should be

made available, if possible.
People who are ill or
vulnerable to illness should
be reminded that they
should stay home for their
safety and for the safety of
others. Ushers/parish staff
should be instructed to
encourage social distancing
if it isn't being properly
observed. Changes by the
State or local authority
could alter this guidance.



Recommendati ons from the Center for Disease Control

The following are recommendations issued by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC):

 Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom; before eating; and after blowing your nose,

- coughing, or sneezing. If soap and water are not readily available, please use alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- Avoid close contact with people who have a cough, fever, or shortness of breath.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- Stay home when you are feeling ill.
- Cough or sneeze into the sleeve of your elbow or use a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash and wash your hands.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces using regular household cleaning sprays or wipes.
